The Director's Vision

The most rewarding aspect of life is having meaningful relationships with others. In fact evidence shows that the absence of human connection can have devastating effects on people. Helping people whom we serve develop connections with others, who are not paid care givers, is one of the biggest challenges en Vision faces in fulfilling its purpose. This is a very important aspect of our work because we know that the absence of relationships can result in isolation, loneliness, increased health problems, and a greater dependence on paid caregivers.

We often use the word 'inclusion' in our work. For decades our local community has been accepting and welcoming of diversity, and extending that welcome to persons who live with an intellectual disability. We have done a good job of making places and events accessible for anyone who wants to participate. While accessibility and connection are both important, they are two entirely different matters. Being present can stimulate the senses and inspire learning but it does not have the same lasting impact that a relationship with another human being has.

The longing for belonging and acceptance lives in each of us. Inclusion is not just about being present and participating in the community. One can be in a room full of people and still experience a sense of being on the outside looking in. True inclusion means that someone finds a sense of belonging; they are missed when not present and others genuinely appreciate the qualities of the person. Inclusion results in reciprocity; both parties benefit from the relationship.

When we ask people we serve what they need us to do to support them well, the answer all too often is "find me a friend". The irony is that many people we serve are not necessarily isolated; they have many staff members coming and going each day. But staff coming and going does not address the loneliness that people feel when they do not have friendships with others who share their interests and who are not paid to be with them.

Although on the surface it may seem that the biggest barrier, for people we serve, in making connections is a lack of communication or social skills, this is not the greatest challenge. The real obstacle is a lack of confidence or awareness on the part of others to know how to engage in communication with someone who has an intellectual disability.

When you see someone with an intellectual disability, be sure to extend a welcome that includes them. Engage in conversation that finds commonality between you and the person. Ask their name – then remember it, find out about their interests, open the door to the person filling a role at an event or in an association, have a coffee or meal together. When you reach out, you will discover that people are not really that different. We all have the same needs and desires.

People we serve have a vast array of interests and life experiences. It's time that more people, than their families and our employees, get to know the interesting, funny, thoughtful people we serve. It's time to find out how all of us have a role to play in and benefit from helping people achieve unrealized dreams and find a sense of belonging.

What Is In Your Boxes?

How will you spread love and respect to all members of our community? It all starts with the changes inside your boxes.

Early in our lives, we start taking in data based on the influence of our parents, extended family and friends, and we begin the process of storing this second-hand information. In many instances, this knowledge proves to be useful and helps us get a solid start in life. But storing only adopted material, versus the creation of some self-produced data, can become problematic.

Imagine for a moment that every belief you have is stored in one of several boxes, and each box represents an important part of your life. You would likely have boxes for parents, family, church, marriage, health, race, career and dozens of others. Our boxes serve us as a place of resource where we have stored our ideas, opinions, and memories. But these same boxes can

also become a barrier between what we know and what we could know. What happens when you encounter someone or a life situation and you don't have a box to put that information into?

Pam Grout, the author of E Squared, explains that this stored information gives us the ability to make split-second decisions and most of this is managed in our subconscious mind. The brain has over 100 billion nerve cells with innumerable extensions. Using these cells and extensions we create neuro-highways. Think of these neuro-highways as super-highways; the kinds we build around large cities. We construct these transportation routes to devise the shortest and most efficient way to get from one place to another. Our

brains do the same thing. Our cerebral expressways are set up early in our life, and most of this information is based on the repetition of what we hear and experience. Once these arteries are established, we pretty much stop traveling elsewhere, because these routes are based on what is most familiar and least complicated to us. This speed and efficiency works wonderfully where matters of driving a car, riding a bike, or brushing our teeth are concerned. But how well do your boxes serve your life when you encounter cirucmstances where you have no

stored information for that experience? Do you have an "I don't know" box or a box labeled "I'll give this further consideration?" What about a "new experiences" box? Do you have one of those?

What science proves is that the miracle of our mind offers great competence. But life is not a series of calculated, black and white experiences. Our ability to mute some of this automation and choose to be more present and adaptable will bring our boxes to life. Our boxes

should have more than one deposit, as we grow and experience life.

Change does not come easily for any of us and deciding to do a little box housekeeping may prove to be a little uncomfortable. Pam Grout also offers that the single, greatest tragedy is our tendency to just look the other way or dismiss the relevence of certain situations because we have no box for it.

Our world is overwhelmed with labels, categories, and differences. Little by little these stereotypes are creating division and eating away at the beauty of our communities. Human beings were engineered for togetherness without conditions and unless we start filling our boxes with new ideas and definitions, we will surely compromise the promise of what we were all created to fulfill.

Jean Vanier once said, "every single human being wants to be looked at with love and respect." Steinbach being the diverse community that it is has people from varying walks of life, much like the folks we serve at en Vision Community Living. Our vision statement,

"to inspire equality, inclusion, and the value of all people" is more than just language or an uplifting catchphrase. This is an expression we are committed to bringing to life in 2019.

Take the box test by asking yourself the following questions. How are you managing the moments in your life where people with different abilities, expressions and appearances cross your path? Does your box only make room for certain individuals with whom you feel

comfortable? How does your belief support the incorporation of everyone regardless of race, disability, religion, and economics? When I say, "inclusion," who do you see yourself sitting with at social functions, out for coffee. or other special events? If we are not thoughtful about the information stored in our boxes we can become stuck or comfortable in a pattern that hinders connection and relationship.

Our 2019 boxes will have to do some stretching if we are

going to seek out and value all people. Those same boxes will have to be spacious enough to accommodate the needs of everyone. The ideas that fill our boxes will have to be generous enough for everyone to feel welcome and wanted. If we only use one or two lenses to view people and circumstances with, our world becomes small and we limit those with whom we build relationships.

Make this a personal challenge to look inward and review the contents of these all-important boxes. Determine that you will not only rework your own boxes but encourage someone else to do likewise. How will you spread love and respect to all members of our community? It all starts with the changes inside your boxes.

Steinbach MCC Donates to enVision! December 14, 2018



Women with a disability are four times more likely to be sexually assaulted than women who do not have a disability. A sobering statistic and one that enVision Community Living takes to heart as we launch our first Women's Self-Defense program at Revelation Martial Arts this winter.

Grant funds provided by Community Living Manitoba have made the program possible. Class sizes are intentionally small to ensure that greater attention can be given to each participant, and it is enVision's hope to make this a sustainable program.

Plans are underway to further support this initiative with a workshop designed to educate women on how to set personal boundaries, know their rights and report violence when it occurs.
