# The Director's Vision

At our recent Make a Difference fundraiser our guests heard the strong message of equality, inclusion, and the value of all people. This message is our vision statement. The fundraiser set out to honour people from all walks of life for taking steps to ensure these outcomes for all people.

Our honourees Sheldon, Natasha and Joel make a difference by their persistence to shatter the stereotypes that get placed on people who live with a disability or people who have different abilities. Each of them has a strong drive to fulfill their passion and their purpose. In the process of following their passion, they have moved others to open doors to opportunities, and to increase the understanding that we are more the same than different.

Our honourees Irene, Joy and Jim make a difference in another way. They all saw unmet needs in others and then took action to meet the needs. They did not just see a need for practical help, each one of them understands that the core need in all people is to be loved and to have a place of belonging. Meeting the practical needs of people has become a way to open the door to helping people in a way that really matters; helping to heal the wounds that come from rejection, isolation, and intolerance.

Our three Young Changemakers can give us hope for the next generation of difference makers. Brooklyn, Dillan and Marie are following their instincts when they see others in need. It's noteworthy that at their young age they are all aware enough to see the needs of others without someone prompting and pointing it out. Each one of them did not turn away when they saw a need. Each one had the courage to say "I can do something to help", and then stepped up to respond.

All nine of our honourees saw others as the same, and deserving of the same

things that you and I have. They saw the humanity of people first, and by their actions; by extending genuine care and concern for others, they have increased equality, inclusion and the value of all people.

Seeing the humanity of people takes an effort to make a difference, from an act of charity, to an act of valuing and building others up. Giving dignity and respect to people is the first step in building rapport and setting the stage for making a difference.

On the flip side when we see people in need as objects of pity, worthy of only basic needs to be met, and as different than you and I, we miss an opportunity to empower and influence people to have a good life. People should not have to "earn" a good life. Everyone is deserving of a good life. I'm not referring to a good life in material ways. I am talking about richness in relationships, in opportunities and in access to the same things you and I enjoy.

There are many people in our community who have been impacted by trauma, rejection and isolation. Every day when you do business, go to church, attend a social event, or participate in recreation, you are rubbing shoulders with others who are hurting and lonely. It's our actions or reactions that can influence whether the wounded person falls into despair, addictions or anti-social behaviour, or whether the person heals and flourishes; fulfilling their purpose as a contributing community member. So, be kind to people, be tolerant and understanding of the hurts of others, be welcoming when you see people on the sidelines, and make a new friend.







Introducing Natasha Vokey - We All Have Different Abilities

"There are no disabilities," says Natasha, "only different abilities." A bold statement much like the life she lives out loud, but also a mantra she captured earlier in her life from a politician named Jim Flaherty. He was responsible for the development of the Registered Disability Savings Plan – an investment program for persons who live with a disability. She was so fascinated with his progressive perspective on "different abilities", that she took it upon herself to call the Prime Minister. This discovery was relayed to her parents through her teacher in grade eight, and sure enough the phone bill provided evidence that Natasha had called not once but twice and was on a first name basis with the operator. She is a straight forward kind of gal and she goes right to the top to get her answers.

Her ability to connect and contribute are what gets her up in the morning and her contagious energy leaves its mark on each one who crosses her path. She is an overcomer and she has achieved a great deal in spite of the obstacles of low expectations handed to her by professionals early in life. Her different abilities have allowed her to stomp on the stereotypes that so often accompany people with different abilities.

You only have to spend just a very few minutes in her presence to know that she is thankful for every opportunity. She has played an important role, in her work and as a volunteer, helping others to feel connected as co-workers and with the public whom she serves. She has hidden talents as demonstrated in her work at Steinbach Credit Union. Her ability to connect and match numbers for the purposes of filing far exceeds what many of us could even hope to achieve. She is an encourager and cheerleader for others in all of her athletic pursuits. Although she is proud of her accomplishments, including female athlete of the year, she takes just as much joy in the accomplishments of others.

She reinforces the idea that we all want to be needed and wanted. She drives home her point by introducing that concept of the "empty seat." We all need to create the "empty seat" and consistently ask ourselves who can we invite to that empty seat at the coffee shop, or over to dinner.



#### Meaningful Moments Training April 29, 30, and May 1, 2019

enVision Community Living had the pleasure of hosting Cara Milne from April 29th to May 1st at the Mennonite Heritage Village. Cara is owner of M-Powered Planning Ltd., a business that promotes positive and valued roles for people with disabilities. She delivered her presentation 3 times to an audience consisting of enVision and other agency staff and family members. Cara also did a presentation to self-advocates. In total, 340 people (231 enVision staff, 9 family members, 55 self-advocates and 45 people from other agencies) heard simple yet sustainable techniques to open doors of opportunties for people we serve to build relationships and experience inclusion in community. A sense or feeling of belonging happens when you are noticed, known and missed. Cara talked about same time/same place, empty seat, take pictures and eat meals together, an invitation and opportunity to engage and belong.

#### Steinbach Branch



# 2018 Foundation Fundraiser a Huge Success!

In 2018-2019, the enVision Foundation raised funds for vehicles to be used by Eastman Employment Services and Kindale Industries. This Fundraising Campaign was a HUGE success! Launched last Spring by the previous fundraising and promotions coordinator, Jo-Anne Dalton, Steinbach and surrounding areas, brought it home for a big finish in December; raising more than \$70,000 in one month.

The 2019 Ford Explorer will continue to service the needs of those who work at Kindale Industries, volunteering and community connections, as well as the flyer distribution process. The 2018 Ford F150 is an integral part of the lawn care program offered through Eastman Employment Services that provides employment to local residents. Plans are underway to explore increased use of this vehicle in the off-season.
